STREET SWEEPING... June 5th—15th

The Public Works Department anticipates having the street sweeper from June 5th - June 15th. Please sweep your sidewalks prior to that time to remove the cinders from the winter months. Streets will be marked with **NO PARKING** signs prior to the sweeping, and individuals found parking in the **NO PARKING** areas will be ticketed by the Police Department. We request that you do not move your vehicle back onto the street until the signs have been removed. Please contact the Borough Office for more information. PROPERTY MAINTENANCE ORDINANCE 574

Section 302.3 **Sidewalks and Driveways.** "All sidewalks, walkways, stairs, driveways, parking spaces and similar areas shall be kept in a proper state of repair, and maintained free from hazardous conditions".

Weeds and grass growing along and, on walking surfaces constitutes tripping hazards and must be removed.

Property owners are responsible to maintain these areas as it is part of the property, and failure to do so may result in the Highspire Borough taking action to cause compliance.

CODES/ZONING

Building and Zoning Permits are required for numerous things including new roofs, electrical service upgrades, decks, additions, fences, storage sheds, garages, swimming pools, and a multitude of other things. New floor coverings, painting, and minor repairs do not require permits. Please call the Borough Office at 717-939-3303 if you need any additional information.

As Summer approaches here are some Borough facts that all residents should be aware of . . . The Borough's Code states that grass and weeds are not to exceed eight (8) inches in height. Don't forget to **mow the grass areas between the sidewalks, curbs and along fencing**. Also, sweep sidewalks and cut weeds. Do not blow grass onto streets. Rubbish is not permitted to accumulate on or around properties. Rubbish includes, but is not limited to paper, rags, cartons, wood, metals, plastics and other items.

SWIMMING POOLS

All swimming pools over 24" deep are regulated by the State Uniform Construction Code. These regulations pertain to any pool, portable, storable, inflatable, or permanent.

- Placement of any pool that can hold 24" or more of water <u>must have a Zoning Permit</u> before being installed.
- Any above ground pool 48" high with rigid sides does not need a fence; however, all steps
 or ladders must be capable of being secured, locked, or removed.
- Any above ground pool 24" to 47" high or in ground pool 24" or more must have a UCC standard fence of at least 48" high around the pool.
- All inflatable pools are regulated the same as all other pools by the UCC.

Please contact the Borough Office prior to the purchase of any pool to make sure you are in compliance with these regulations.

BOROUGH CROSSWALKS

ALL MOTORISTS should be aware of pedestrian and crosswalk regulations.

- Any driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way to any pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection.
- No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close as to constitute a hazard.
- Whenever any vehicle is stopped at any crosswalk at an intersection or at any marked crosswalk to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.



KEEP ALERT FOR CHILDREN AT PLAY

While driving, please remember to watch out for children running into the streets. As a reminder to parents, the street is not a safe place for children to play. The Borough provides several recreation facilities for this purpose.

What is Storm Water?

Storm water is water from precipitation that flows across the ground and pavement when it rains or when snow and ice melt. The water seeps into the ground or drains into what we call storm sewers. These are the drains you see at street corners or at low points on the sides of streets. Collectively, the draining water is called storm water runoff.

Good Rain Gone Wrong

Storm water becomes a problem when it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants as it flows or when it causes flooding and erosion of stream banks. Storm water travels through a system of pipes and roadside ditches that make up storm sewer systems. It eventually flows directly to a lake, river, stream, wetland, or coastal water. All of the pollutants storm water carries along the way empty into our waters, too, because storm water does not get treated!



Pet wastes left on the ground get carried away by storm water, contributing harmful bacteria, parasites and viruses to our water.

Vehicles drip fluids (oil, grease, gasoline, antifreeze, brake fluids, etc.) onto paved areas where storm water runoff carries them through our storm drains and into our water.





Chemicals used to grow and maintain beautiful lawns and gardens, if not used properly, can run off into the storm drains when it rains or when we water our lawns and gardens.

Waste from chemicals and materials used in construction can wash into the storm sewer system when it rains. Soil that erodes from construction sites causes environmental degradation, including harming fish and shellfish populations that are important for recreation and our economy.

ORDINANCE #646 OF 2023

An Ordinance of the Borough Council of the Borough of Highspire, Dauphin County, Pennsylvania, amending Chapter 10 of the Highspire Borough Code of Ordinances to add a new chapter entitled "Quality of Life Improvement Ordinance", Part 5, which provides (1) a ticketing program to potentially resolve certain property maintenance and other property violation matters in a more expeditious manner than traditional ordinance enforcement, (2) procedures for issuing tickets under the ticketing program, and (3) preserves traditional ordinance enforcement and further provides for severability, failure to enforce not a waiver, applicability, and effective date.
